A foster parent preserves a year shared with two children




There are many personal reasons to preserve digital materials on Permanent.org and not all of them are a personal legacy. Sometimes we may be the stewards of others' stories.

Robert and his wife are foster parents for young children. They want to make sure that the memories their foster children create with them are stored in a safe place so that, when they're ready to revisit their past, they have a complete picture of their life preserved.

Foster children are often returned to challenging conditions, family instability, and financial insecurity. For many biological families, the care and preservation of important materials comes at a cost they cannot afford.

Permanent.org makes it easy for Robert to create Permanent Archives for his foster kids, upload digital materials that tell their story, share ownership with other adults in the children's life, and personally endow their permanent storage.
